 - Exhibit 11 FY 20/21, Contractor CoC pricing, which replaces Amendment No. 23 Exhibit 11 in its entirety and is attached and incorporated herein.
- 3. This Amendment and all of its Exhibits are hereby made a part of this Contract. All other terms and conditions of the Contract shall remain in full force and effect. Except as otherwise expressly set forth herein, the terms and conditions contained in the Contract and subsequent amendments are unchanged. This Amendment sets forth the entire understanding between the Parties with regard to the subject matter hereof.

1. Program Narrative:

Many of our inmates have experience in barbering, but do not hold professional certification that will enable the assurance of gainful employment upon release. With this proposed barbering course, inmates will be able to earn professional certificates and gain the knowledge and skills necessary to pass the State Board Exams. Barbering is a Personal Services Industry and one of the top ten fastest growing industries in Florida with an expected growth rate of 4% between 2020 and 2025. This course follows a standard industry curriculum and will give the inmate verifiable credentials in the field of Barbering that will be the foundation for a successful career when he returns to the general population.

2. Specific Activities:

Barbering is a 1200 hour course; 450 hours are instructor supervised on-the job training as barbers on the compound and 750 hours involves classroom instruction. Under the projected class schedule, the course will last 50 weeks with a combined 30 hours of practical and classroom participation per week. The necessary application and testing to achieve a state license will be facilitated upon completion of gthe course. The class size is designed at an optimum 20 to 1 ratio.

3. How does this program have the potential to aid inmates' reintegration into society?

This program is structured to give an inmate the credentials and knowledge to support himself immediately upon release with a well paying trade.

4. What are the specific goals and objectives of this program?

The goal of this program is to validate the practical experience in Barbering gained thus far and to have imates to get the necessary education and credentials to earn to license to practice their trade in the State of Florida.

Progress of this project could be reviewed through an inmate survey evaluating inmate wellness and increased access to playing softball across the prison population.

Transitional Housing: The goal is to link Post Release Participants to immediate housing upon release. Housing provides stability which enables retuning citizens to focus on participating in necessary services (i.e., education, employment, treatment, and self-help groups). Estimated number is based upon immates currently releasing with an unmet need. Average price of transitional beds is \$ per night.

Transportation: To ensure that our Post Release Participants have the capability to attend supportive services (i.e., treatment, school, work and supervising agencies), GEO plans to partner with local transportation companies to provide monthly bus passes for individuals compliant with their Release Action Plan. We have also identified organizations willing to provide bicycles for those in need. Estimated number based upon inmates currently releasing with an unmet transportation need. Average rate of monthly bus pass is § ...

Employment Services: GEO has established relationships with organizations that have a network of "felony friendly" employers. GEO will seek linkage to organizations assisting with vocational readiness courses. Estimated number based on inmates currently releasing with unmet employment services need. Services based on copay to attend employment readiness groups and placement services average § monthly.

Education Services: GEO will establish working relationships with organizations that enables Post Release Participants to obtain a High School Equivalency (HSE) certificate. In addition, we will promote continued higher education when applicable. Estimated number based upon inmates currently releasing with unmet continuing education needs. Service based upon HSE classes and cost to take GED test.

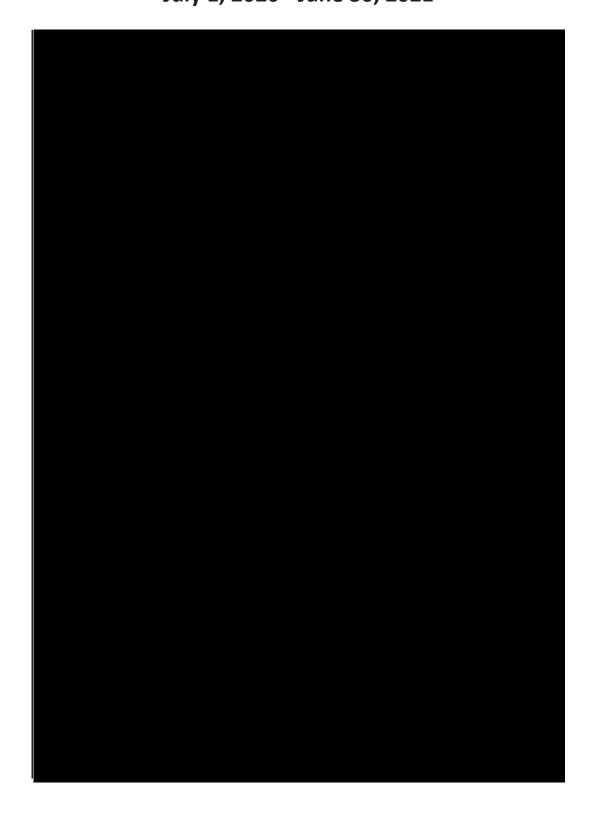
<u>Clothing Assistance:</u> To ensure that our Post Release Participants have the ability to dress accordingly for job searches, employment, and any community-based service they may be attending, GEO will establish relationships with providers and provide a one-time stipend for clothing based upon need.

<u>Food Assistance:</u> GEO has established relationships with providers in the community to assist Post Release Participants with obtaining food upon their release. This connection will provide the Participant with a food voucher for up to three months.

Aftercare Treatment: Based upon the needs of Post Release Participants, ongoing post release aftercare treatment may be recommended. Quality community-based organizations that provide substance abuse, anger management, parenting, mental health, and any other supportive programs which reduce the risk to recidivate. Estimated number based on immates currently releasing with an unmet need. Assume 2 sessions per month at \$\frac{1}{2}\$ per session.
