- Alexander Graham Bell, father of the telephone, worked as a Census Bureau agent.

- More than 2 million public employees protect our nation through service in our armed forces.

The legislature must pass only one bill – the budget. This year was exceptionally challenging as lawmakers had roughly \$6 billion less than expected. These changes are natural in the long-term financial cycle but challenging nonetheless. While we did not any see any increases in salaries or bonuses for employees, we also did not see an increase in insurance premiums. There were a number of bills we supported that did not make it in the end.

It's a fascinating process, and it requires a great deal of behind-the-scenes support from you here at DMS. I want to recognize Legislative Affairs Director **Jenny Robertson** for a job well-done during her first legislative session. And of course her deputy, **Elizabeth Irvin**, who helped Jenny understand how we do things here in the South. Chief of Staff **Ken Granger**, who is often a voice of reason, once again used his good judgment to keep us above the chaos.

I know there are hundreds of you who worked late, came in early and met impossible deadlines to turn around bill analyses. These required your expertise and attention to detail. I am so very proud of your diligence, never shrugging off how changes to the law impact us all.

So thank you. I encourage you to use the coming summer months to refresh and rejuvenate yourselves. Enjoy time with your family and always make sure to take care of yourselves. We have good things to accomplish!

MS Chief Information Officer

Just what does a chief information officer do?

I'm responsible for the overall management of all information for the agency, most of which involves our computer systems. That means we take care of things like processing business information, keeping it secure and making it available to the public.

What takes up most of your time each day?

Building our information management system to create strong and stable computer programs and systems, and monitoring and managing our costs for information technology (IT). I also make sure our practices are secure and that we are able to recover quickly in the event of a disaster.

Where are you from originally and how did you land at DMS?

I was born and raised in Tampa, and graduated from the University of Tampa. I worked in IT for the largest third-party insurance administrator in the world for a number of years before I started consulting, which ultimately brought me to Tallahassee. I landed at DMS because I recognized an opportunity to make improvements in state government and have been here now for more than three years.

What motto/phrase/advice do you try to live by?

Don't be afraid to make mistakes, but make sure you learn from them.

What's the last book you read?


Good to Great by Jim Collins. I also enjoy reading books about the outdoors.

Benton Building/Fort Pierce Regional Service Center

The Benton Building in Fort Pierce, built in 1995, is dedicated to Dr. Clem C. Benton (1898-1982), a Florida native who settled in Fort Pierce in 1929. He was a physician, humanitarian and entrepreneur who served his community in many ways.

The facility is located in the historic downtown area of Fort Pierce, and the property is surrounded by beautiful huge oak and palm trees. The building has more than 89,000 square feet and is adjacent to the historic tidal creek known as Moore's Creek, home to the endangered water (sea) turtles and blue crabs, and visited by rare water birds, alligators and manatees.



Together, George and Mark manage the day-to-day operations for this "full-service" facility, also known as the Fort Pierce Regional Service Center, Serving St. Lucie, Indian River, Martin and Okeechobee counties, tenants include the Departments of Children and Families, Revenue, Juvenile Justice and the Agency for Persons with Disabilities, which means more than 1,000 citizens visit the facility each day. George Kassees and Mark Richard in front of the Benton Building in Fort Pierce.



april accomplishments

Division of State Group Insurance – Hosted the first annual Open Enrollment Partner's Kick-Off meeting, with nearly 50 vendors present. Exchanged ideas to improve the open enrollment process for state enrollees and retirees.

Davis Productivity Awards – Received six Prudential Financial-Davis Productivity Awards, with two DMS teams receiving the highest levels of recognition possible. (For a complete list of DMS winners see the April 2008 issue of *DMS Difference*.)

MyFloridaNet Migration – Communications and Information Technology Services (CITS) successfully migrated statewide customers to the new MyFloridaNet data transport network. Without increased costs to taxpayers this migration enables the state's technology to run more efficiently with increased capacity and security, while allowing for communications services to evolve as the state's needs change.

FIorida Retirement System (FRS) – Two new agencies joined FRS in April. Between July 1, 2007, and April 30, 2008, 29 agencies joined or rejoined FRS.

DMS Logo – Developed first-ever, agency logo to assist with branding.

Workforce Assistance – Proactively working with state agencies affected by reduced positions (as it relates to budget cuts) to help them transition employees.

Public Service Recognition – Developed materials and promotional items to assist agencies in recognizing employees during Public Service Recognition Week/Day.

Mentor Protégé Agreement – Launched two mentor protégé initiatives. This innovative program connects minority-and women-owned businesses with corporations for business development mentoring.

Online Minority Certification Program – Launched the first phase of *Vendorstrator*, to transition to online certification and recertification of minority business enterprises and improve the process for minority businesses seeking certification.

OSD Link – Distributed the online newsletter, April *OSD Link*, to 4,000 women and minority business enterprises.

all paper, not just white paper, can be recycled at the CCOC. This includes magazines, newspapers, colored paper, soft bound books, cardboard, etc.

The Division of Retirement received the Certificate of Environmental Accomplishments for participating in the Shred-It recycling program. The team saved 150 trees from destruction in 2007. Way to go!

recipe of the month

Two quick and easy meals this month for your grilling pleasure!

Steak on a Stick (4 servings)

1/4 cup sherry

I tablespoon soy sauce

11/2 cups wine vinegar

1½ teaspoon ketchup

1½ teaspoon honey

Dash of garlic powder

I pound boneless sirloin steak, cut into I-inch cubes

Combine first six ingredients in a large shallow dish. Add steak, mix, cover and let marinate at least two hours in fridge, turning occasionally. Thread steak onto skewers. Grill five minutes on each side over medium coals or until desired degree of doneness. Baste with marinade.

Sea Scallop Kebobs (4 servings)

I small onion, grated

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon lime juice

½ teaspoon sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

Pinch of black pepper

I pound fresh scallops

 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter or margarine, melted



Combine first five ingredients in a shallow dish. Add scallops, tossing gently to coat. Cover and marinate at least two hours in refrigerator, stir often. Place scallops on skewers and grill five minutes on each side over medium coals, basting with butter. NOTE: Can bake in the oven (350 degrees) in the marinade.

Real Estate's new work order system

In January the Division of Real Estate Development and Management released a Web Based Customer Service Work Request System. The new system allows our customers to enter service requests online and track the status, any time. Through March, more than 6,000 work requests were submitted using the system, and of those surveyed so far, 98 percent were satisfied or extremely satisfied. Summer hours

Flexible work hours are always available for state employees, but may be more popular during the summer. DMS employees may use flexible schedules for the summer months, from Memorial Day, May 26 through September I (including the Labor Day holiday).

For example, you may work nine hour days Monday through Thursday and from 8 a.m. to noon on Friday. Or you may take 30 minutes for lunch Monday through Thursday and work from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Friday. You need to work out the specifics with your supervisor to be sure it fits the needs of your work area.

Each division must ensure that services are not interrupted or negatively impacted. Please talk with your supervisor to determine if your work schedule can be "flexed" while still meeting the business needs of your specific work area.

Once approved, complete and submit a flexible schedule request to your supervisor through the People First System.
